THIS WEEK'S GOSPEL REFLECTION...... THE PASSING OF TIME

Next week, we will bring this liturgical year (Year B/Mark's Gospel) to an end, with the celebration of the Feast of Christ the King. Another year has passed. It's a fitting moment then to think about the passing of time and, indeed, of the end time and the passing away of the world.



So, in our last reading for this year from the Gospel of Mark, he writes about the end time. He knows, at the time of his writing, that his audience is suffering oppression and persecution and is thinking and expecting the end time is nigh. He writes to comfort and assure them.

The Book of Daniel, from which the first reading comes, is an influential apocalyptic writing from the Old Testament, well known among the Jews at this time. It tells of the oppression and persecution of the Jewish people in earlier times. In it the prophet Daniel proclaims the resurrection of the dead: "Those who are wise shall shine like the brightness of the sky, and those who lead many to righteousness, like the stars forever and ever."

In his gospel, Mark writes about the end time in similarly apocalyptic terms that his listeners will understand. He recalls Jesus teaching his disciples that the things of this world and indeed time itself will pass away. "Heaven and earth will pass away," Jesus teaches, "but my words will not pass away."

As for when this will happen, Jesus tells the parable of the fig tree. When the fig tree puts forth its new leaves, we know that summer is approaching. In other words, watch for the signs of the times.

Not even Jesus knows – only the Father – when that time will be, but there is no doubting that an end time will come. There is also no doubting that God's designs will not be thwarted and that the reign of God will triumph.

But Mark's point is that, before the end time, the gospel must be preached to the whole world.

This indeed is our time and our mission. We, like the Christians for whom Mark wrote his gospel, live in the in-between time, the time between the time of Jesus and the end time. For us, as for them, this is a time for preaching and spreading the good news of the kingdom.

St Francis of Assisi urged his followers, "Preach always," adding, "and, if necessary, use words." We, as disciples of Jesus, are called to preach the good news of Jesus, to take the good news of God's abundant and steadfast love to every part of the world in which we live. We too must preach always in our actions first and foremost, in love of neighbour, compassion for the broken-hearted, care for the marginalised, and concern for those in need. Let our actions speak every day.

LITURGY CORNER:

THE COLLECTION

In the early years of Christianity, the faithful brought bread and wine with them to church to be used in the celebration of the Eucharist. What wasn't used at the Mass was given to the poor and needy. Later, people started bringing other gifts of food or money which were offered for the work of the Church.

In most parishes a collection of money is taken up during the Preparation of Gifts and the money brought forward with the gifts of bread and wine. This action is an integral part of the liturgy because our offering links us to the sacrifice of the cross.

Visitors to a Catholic Church are often surprised (and sometimes embarrassed!) when the collection plate comes around a second time at Mass. Having two collections is a way of separating donations for the support of the clergy from contributions to the cost of the parish services and operations.

LAY COMMUNION MINISTERS

Lay people who help distribute Holy Communion at Mass and to the sick are called *Extra-ordinary Ministers of Holy Communion*. The word 'extraordinary' indicates that they are not the ordinary or usual ministers of communion – ordained clergy.

The ministry was first established by Pope Paul VI in 1973. Because more people were now coming to Communion at Mass and it was being offered under both kinds, the distribution of Communion had become difficult for the clergy to manage alone. Also, when the ordinary ministers are unable to take Communion frequently to the sick and aged, lay ministers are needed to take on this ministry.

The role of special ministers is to serve the assembly by distributing the elements during the Communion Rite, so they are Ministers of Communion not 'ministers of the Eucharist' or 'eucharistic ministers'.

Communion ministers are carefully selected and commissioned by the parish. They are required to undertake liturgical and spiritual formation as well as practical training.


UPDATE FROM LAUREN



WORLD DAY of the POOR

The World Day of the Poor will be observed on Sunday coinciding with the 33rd Sunday of the Year.

This year's theme is 'The prayer of the poor rises up to God', which Pope Francis says is based on a phrase from the Book



The 2024 celebration will be the eighth since 2017 when Pope Francis called for the third Sunday in November to be set aside for the poor. It comes as Rome prepares to welcome pilgrims from around the world for the 2025 Jubilee year.

Speaking to the poor directly, Pope Francis says not to lose the certainty that "God is attentive to each of you and is close to you". And as the book of Sirach states, "the Lord's judgment will be in favour of the poor" and from poverty, therefore, "the song of the most genuine hope can spring up".

The nature of mutual benefit is stated in the World Day of the Poor logo. There is an open door and two people on the roadside. Both are extending a hand. While one is seeking assistance, the other intends to help. The two arms express solidarity, inviting the other to exit the door and to meet.

"We need to make the prayer of the poor our own and pray together with them. This is a challenge we must embrace and a pastoral activity that needs to be nurtured," says Pope Francis.

"Moreover, the worst discrimination which the poor suffer is the lack of spiritual care.

"The great majority of the poor have a special openness to the faith; they need God and we must not fail to offer them his friendship, his blessing, his word, the celebration of the sacraments and a journey of growth and maturity in the faith."



Lord, open our eyes to the struggles of others. Fill our hearts with kindness and let our actions spread hope. Help us to show Your love in everything we do, supporting those in need and working for a more just and compassionate world. Amen.
